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To whom it may concern

my name is Roddy Maude-Roxby. I am an actor, aged fifty three, married to Jane and with two daughters Hannah and Alice, now in their twenties. My mother is still alive, my father died in seventy one. He was a vicar in the Church of England as was his father and grandfather. I published five children's books, aged 14. I did National Service with the Royal Air Force and was commissioned as a Pilot Officer and promoted to Flying Officer on the reserve, that was circa 1953.

I went to the Royal College of Art and studied fine art, edited the R.C.A. magazine and was

President of the Drama group. I am an A.R.C.A.  
my first work in the professional theatre came  
from notice at the R.C.A.. I went into a revue  
for new writers "One to Another" (959) and was  
included in the formation of the Royal Court  
Theatre Studio and then in a number of productions  
at the Royal Court from 'One Way Pendulum' (59)  
The Three Sisters (Glenda Jackson 67) and the original  
stage production of Joe Orton's 'Epingham Camp' (67)  
to Brecht's 'Man is Man' (71). During that time I went  
to New York with 'The Establishment' and was in Mike  
Nichols' production of "The Knack" (64). I was in the  
original production of 'Haseas Corpus' with Sir Alec Guinness  
(93) and later played his role in an Oxford  
Playhouse production that toured South America and  
Mexico (78). During the late sixties and early  
seventies, I and three other actors formed "Theatre Machine"  
a group whose work is based on improvisation. We have  
toured Europe and Canada and visited Mexico.

our techniques are used in Education,  
notably by Hampshire Education Committee, and I  
have worked with the Probation Service, Paddington  
Day Centre, H.M. Prison Wormwood Scrubs. (70).

An organization called C.U.R.E for young addicts  
('67). Community (M.Barnett). Oundle School,  
and more recently The Actors' Centre and the  
Arts Council course for Young Directors, and classes  
at R.A.D.A. and the Guildhall. I am just about to  
go to Norsk Skuespillerforbund in Oslo, to teach.

I wrote a play 'The Best of est' for Theatre Machine  
last year and have one word to say in Hugh Hudson's  
latest film 'Greystoke' which filmed in Africa.

I was the voice of the Butler in Walt Disney's film  
The Aristocats and I was in the first series of  
Rowan & Martin's "Laugh-In". With Andrew Dickson  
I formed a company of two, 'Willie Co', to take  
our two man shows to the Edinburgh Festival.

We have just finished working with Liz Rothschild

on a Community project for Wells-next-the-sea called 'The Sea & the Spark'. an open air event.

You see, I am an actor/painter/comic and my work took me near teaching and therapy in play. I read Jung and I read Maslow and a lot of people I'd worked with or heard of went to India and I'd get letters from Poona and read Bhagwan and listen to tapes and go to groups. I went to Kalptaru, the London centre, and I went to groups taken by Somendra and I saw videotapes and I don't know how I delayed so long. I wrote and posted my letter to Germany and then my Jane said yes, she'd already written her letter to Bhagwan and posted to India; Bhagwan had already left India and we were differently advised where to post, this is only to emphasise that we decided, as we thought, individually. Our Samygas letters

with our new names arrived on the same day,  
 one from India, one from Germany. Her Sannyas  
 name is Ma prem geeta, mine is Nirdosh Roddy.  
 The two letters have the same date : July 26. 81.  
 By chance, we both got our males on the same day.  
 She was in London and I was in Edinburgh. But  
 you know what Jung says : "synchronicity".

For us Bhagwan Shree Rajneesh is a Master.  
 That is somehow outside the expectancy of the son of  
 three generations of vicars and yet the Church  
 of England was not very interesting to me.  
 It is more interesting now. And so is Jesus.  
 Bhagwan, as a Teacher, a Master, enlivens.  
 He enlivens America. I feel "my god you  
 are lucky. Is it by chance he is there?".

I have visited the ranch with Jane, Geeta,  
 twice now. We never went to India and

it did seem as if the ashram was 'all very Indian' there. His teaching seems different in America. More essential. Bhagwan has said he is the bridge. It is so obvious that at present the West needs to learn from the East and vice versa. We also know that what doesn't want to learn will try and reject.

I just opened the Journals of Abraham Maslow. 1968. Jan 7. "Thought. The revolution, the humanistic 3<sup>rd</sup> & 4<sup>th</sup> Force revolution is essentially an American revolution. As of today the U.S. is the centre of the world of the new 3<sup>rd</sup> and 4<sup>th</sup> force psychology. There is no rival. But more than this, it is historically America also e.g.: Jefferson. Whitman. Bill of Rights, Constitution. democracy. Thoreau, Emerson, Transcendentalism, etc. Fits very well in the American Stream (altho also in the Jewish, the

mystical, the Zen, Tao etc:)." 4

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That is lifted from Abraham Maslow. I could look out other quotes; for me Jung predicted Bhagwan. Both would have had to consider Bhagwan and his work at Rajneeshpuram. And you have to too. Beyond that is love. Yrs. Nirush Roddy.
